INFANT/TODDLER WORKSHOP

The Role of Observation in Constructing and Reconstructing Our Infant Toddler Communities

In the words of my trainer—the first AMS Living Legacy recipient, Sr. Carolina Gomez del Valle—"Without observation there is no Montessori." In part one, we will explore the uses of observation to understand the impact of adult behavior on the environment and how we might modify our behavior to offer the independence and freedom children need to thrive. We know that following the child is impossible without communication with parents and action research. In part two, we will look at common obstacles we see to children's development and how they arise from our commonsense beliefs and our past experiences with education. We will discuss how we may work to eliminate them, thus freeing the child to experience the joy and contentment of doing real work.
